She paid us twenty five cents a month to get water from our well house. She washed in a big black pot out side with lots of bleach. That was when Mr. Stanford was still living and was bedridden and in the room to the left when you walk in. I would walk the dirt roads to the store at Cotton Plant with her and get a fudge ice cream bar and we would have lots of good talks. Mother would tell me not to ask for food when I would walk across to see her but everything she cooked smelled so good. I just had to have the sweet tea and good fresh vegetables from her little garden. I could go on and on. The pretty flowers she planted around the garden fence, pears wrapped in newspaper in the old dark closet, picking up hickory nuts from the trees behind the house, sweeping the dirt yard...anyway, I bought a picture of a house that looks a lot like the one she lived in just because I have such great memories of her and my childhood. I love her dearly and tell everyone about her.*
